

## Personnel Complete FF Safety & Survival Training

Several members of the department completed the Firefighter Safety and Survival (RIT) program taught by instructors from the NH Fire Academy recently. The weekend long program consisted of classroom instruction on Friday evening and practical evolutions on Saturday and Sunday. Personnel learned how to remove trapped firefighters from narrow confined areas in a drill that was developed after a firefighter fatality in Denver, CO. They also learned how to use a rope or hose line to rescue a firefighter that had fallen through a floor. This drill is known as the Columbus drill, developed after a tragedy in Ohio. In addition, everyone Capt. French prepares to complete the Ladder Bail a techhad to maneuver their way through a wire maze which simulated low hanging wires from newer construction materials including flexible ductwork. cable and network wiring that is readily prevalent in today's construction.

Also covered were a few self rescue techniques: how to breech a wall to escape a room that is ripe for flashover and how to utilize the bail out ropes that are attached to all the departments SCBA's.

The class was primarily taught by Jeff Allison who also works per diem at Milford Ambulance, and captain Mike Clark from Hanover, NH. It is safe to say that all of the participants were a little sore for the super bowl. The practical evolutions were conducted at the Ciardelli property on Nashua Street.
